Verge 2014: Redeemed to Redeem is a clarion call to remember and live out the truth that we have been first loved by God, and it is out of this supernatural love from God that we can then supernaturally love others. It is because of God's justice that we can now pursue justice. It is because God was first on mission that we can now pursue His mission. We have been redeemed to redeem.

In all of this we pray that Jesus would be our goal, our hope, our strength, our model, our value, our significance, our worth, and our passion.

"And whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me." —Matthew 18:5 (NIV)

World Vision is a Christian humanitarian organization dedicated to working with children, families, and their communities worldwide to reach their full potential by tackling the causes of poverty and injustice.

Several years ago, I spent quite a lot of time going in and out of South Sudan during the decades-long civil war that ravaged the nation and its people. I took part in different missions to deliver much-needed food and lifesaving medicine, encouraging the local Christians as we preached the gospel whenever we could.

These experiences were life-changing for me in so many ways, but one of the biggest things that stuck out—and began to stick to me—was how different "church" was in Sudan compared to the life I was living as a Christian, father, and pastor in the United States.

It seemed that whenever I was

over there in Africa with the Sudanese believers we were the Church. Me and them. Together, we were the Church.

They didn't have buildings or any resources to "do" church. No elaborate Sunday services with lights and sound systems. They just are the Church. Loving each other, sharing what very, very little they had, literally laying their lives down for the sake of the gospel. And these Christians who owned nothing (no-things) were so filled with joy. Seriously.

One day, while we were distributing food in a refuge camp near the border of

Uganda, I met a young man who looked to be about twelve years old at the time. "Who are you?" I asked him. His name was James. He was tall, super thin, and just like everyone else in this camp, he had lived through near-starvation and brutal attacks by militant rebels that had decimated his village. I noticed that his left hand and arm were pretty scarred and disfigured, and he had a large patch of hair missing that seemed to have been burned off at some point in the past. I asked our translator if he knew what had happened to the boy. He asked James to tell me his story.

James shared that a few months earlier he and his two brothers were walking with their parents when radical, Islamic soldiers hacked his parents to death with machetes, right before their very eyes—because they were Christians. The soldiers then threw him and his two brothers onto a large pile of burning garbage. His brothers died in the fire that day, but James somehow managed to crawl out of the fire and escape with his life He then went on to tell me how grateful he was!

I'm not kidding. He was thankful that God had spared his life against all odds that dreadful day, and he knew that he would one day see his family again in heaven and that they were in a safe place now with Jesus. I was blown away. I wept like a baby.

As I spent more time with James and other Christians in the refuge camp that day, I couldn't help but notice that they exhibited a joy that was unbelievable. They were the happiest people I had ever been with in my life.

Amid the war, horrible famine, and persecution they suffered on a daily basis, these brothers and sisters in Christ were filled with a sense of peace and joy that I had never personally experienced. Shouldn't I, with all of my American health, wealth, and comfort be happier and more grateful than them?

I remember crying out to God, saying, "I would trade everything I have to experience the joy they find in you!" And God replied, "Then do."

Ouch. It sort of felt like what Jesus had to say to the rich young ruler in Matthew 19. Paraphrasing, here's the story: "A young man came up to Jesus and asked, "What good things must I do to get into the Kingdom?" Jesus replied, "God is the only one who is good. Follow his commandments." The man said, "I have obeyed his commands—what else must I do?" "Go sell everything you have and give the money to the poor and you will have heavenly treasures. Then, come and follow me." Did I need to get rid of all of my personal (and my family's) possessions in order to find true joy and purpose in my Christian life? Did I need to move to Africa to really be the Church?

The point of this story Jesus told wasn't to get us all to go and sell our stuff; it was for us to see where our true treasure, hope, and delight is found. Do we find our happiness, security and purpose in our stuff and from what we do—or in who we are because of who He is?

James and the other Sudanese Christians that I spent time with had no possessions, no country, no homes, and in some cases no earthly families nothing left to put their hope in. But they had found the only thing that truly satisfies our hearts: Jesus. They didn't have or need material possessions to be happy, and there was nothing profound for them to do.

They had found their very

life—their identity and


purpose—in Jesus.

As Christians they (and we) are a part of a family whose father is God himself. Jesus is our brother. And we have been sent by the Spirit on a life-altering mission to see more and more people come to know Jesus, and find eternal life and the same peace that he offers. It is Jesus who pursues, secures, and maintains our position in the family of God. He died that we might be restored to a right relationship with his Father, back into the family we were originally created to be a part of. Jesus, our servant king, gave us his indwelling Spirit and sent us out on his mission. It's all about Jesus.

The Bible teaches that if we are in Christ, we have become part of a family of missionary servants, sent as disciples who make disciples. This is who we are. This is our new identity. The more we understand and believe this to be true, the more our lives will be transformed and the more peace, joy and purpose we will find in life. 

HOW NOT TO BE A RACIST by Bryan Loritts What is culture? Before you're quick to answer that, know that every expert that I've studied has at least admitted to there being historical confusion when it comes to pinpointing a definition for the term (my doctoral studies involve me engaging in extensive research over the subject).

I'm actually relieved that the experts are confused, because I've personally been ambiguous to the whole matter as well. Malcolm Gladwell, acclaimed writer, points out that there's an old yiddish expression that says to a fly in horseradish the whole world is horseradish.

The same could be said of a fish in water, and of each of us as individuals. Culture is just so much a part of who we are that it's really the house we live in. So trying to define culture is like asking the fly to define horseradish.

As people who don't live in horseradish or water we can describe these two entities quite well, but why? Don't dismiss the question so fast, because it's our ability to answer this question that we can begin to at least thoughtfully engage the culture question.

We can accurately discuss the properties of water, and it's uniqueness, pointing out its strengths and weaknesses because we have experienced its counterpart – land. To a fly who knows nothing other than horseradish, we can point out its bitter properties, because we've experienced other things, sweet things. In each of these cases, what allows a person to speak intelligently about another person's culture, is having experienced both their "culture," along with a different one.

When the fly never ventures out of horseradish, and the fish remains in water, they not only are blinded to the culture of others, they are blinded to themselves.

A recent study reveals that the majority of African-Americans still believe that race is a huge issue in our society, while the majority of whites do not think that race is a significant factor. I'm not here to affirm or dispute the report, but at the very least, what these findings reveal is the continued chasm that exists between these two ethnicities.

What's more is that I posted this on my facebook page and the responses were interesting. Many of the white respondents suggested that race and culture is being made too much of, while many of the blacks said that it's still an issue. Ironically, the comments to my facebook status supported the findings of the report.

All of the white people I know who have genuine, authentic friendships with minorities will tell you that race is still very much a factor in this country. And all of the whites that I know who push back, or bristle at such a statement don't have genuine friendships with minorities. The difference? One of horseradish.

Those who confine themselves to their own culture, and never come out to richly taste and engage in others will unfortunately remain completely unaware to life's not so sweet realities, and in the process will become unaware of themselves.

What's true for one ethnic group, is true of another. Too many of the blacks that I know who are of your Public Enemy, rage against the machine, Malcolm X types, who speak in broad suspicious generalizations of whites don't have truly authentic white friendships.

While those who have compassion for our white brothers and sisters, have had the bitter edges buffed off of them only by the joyful sweet experience of coming out of their own personal horseradish to do life with whites, and in the process of engagement they've not only come to appreciate another culture, but themselves more fully as well.

Culture only has meaning in relation to other cultures.

God understood this profoundly, and that is why Jesus came not to eradicate culture, but to establish a

"Master Culture" if you will, called the body of Christ.

This new "Master Culture" does not demolish my human culture, it simply redefines it.

Horseradish should never be eaten by itself, but when a touch of it is applied to such meats as lamb, now it takes on a whole new meaning. Likewise, Paul's sentiments in Galatians 3 when he says that in Christ there is neither Jew nor Gentile, he is not advocating the dismissal of culture, how could he?

After all this was the man who was called to the Gentiles, planted multi-ethnic churches, had one of his disciples submit to the cultural act of bodily circumcision, continue to engage personally in Jewish cultural customs, and boldly proclaimed to the Corinthians that to the Jew he became a Jew. Any suggestion that Paul was anti-human culture is at best biblically naïve and irresponsible.

What Paul understood is that culture by itself is as meaningless as being served a plate of horseradish for dinner, with nothing else. Culture only finds meaning when submitted to Jesus Christ, as I take part in the new master race called the body of Christ. When culture is un-tethered from the cross and made a lone entity, I've just committed the sin of idolatry.

The reality is that our nation is trending towards diversity. The church

has no option but to maintain the same trajectory, not so much forward, but backward to her first century roots where the normal was ethnic diversity. A failure to do so will put us perilously close to being irrelevant to the changing face of our society.

As leaders, we must come out of our horseradish. Engage others who look and think different from you, but do so to the glory of God. Don't be ashamed of your culture, but don't revel in it either–let God sanctify and redeem it. In the process what you'll discover is a greater affection for Christ, others, and a greater awareness of who He's created you to be.

Honestly, preparing was sort of a train wreck. I have lots of thoughts on the topic, but too much for one talk so, I tried to zoom out and just say the thing that I think matters most.

We are never going to be or make disciples if we aren't willing to be uncomfortable.

We love to be uncomfortable in the areas we are comfortable. I like to be challenged theologically because I'm comfortable with that. Some of you are willing to leave your homes and move across the world and be 'uncomfortable' because that's the kind of discomfort that seems exciting to you.

But for us to become disciples of Christ it means that we have to be willing to actually be uncomfortable, in the ways that make us the most uneasy. To be a disciple we must be comfortable with the terribly uncomfortable sensation of being weak.

Our postmodern world has issues with real weakness. Don't get me wrong, we are all cool with our life being hashtagged #raw and #vulnerable. We'll blog or teach about our weaknesses and then pat ourselves on the back for being so comfortable being weak. But really, we only want to talk expose the vulnerabilities that we control. We want to wage war on our faults, but only the ones that don't really threaten the places or people that are most precious to us.

Coming face to face your deepest weaknesses in a real way is terrifying. It feels awful. So we hide. We are willing to be challenged in huge rooms where we can be anonymous or behind our computer screens, but our hearts tremble when our spouse or friend says: 'I see something in you that might need to be challenged'.

But true discipleship must happen in the spaces where we have no room to eject when our dearest idols are threatened. It may feel horrible in the moment, but for us to be changed by the Spirit, we are going to have to open ourselves up to the discomfort of true vulnerability.

To make disciples we must be comfortable with the terribly uncomfortable sensation of exhorting the weak. Us sneaky postmoderns have found a way to exhort the weak without discomfort. We'll challenge others behind our keyboards or behind their backs. We let prayer for others replace exhortation. We send our spouse a link to listen to someone else speak over them the things we are too afraid to say.

But here's the deal: the command to make disciples wasn't given just to an elite group with specific communication gifts. It was given to each of us. God's 39

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

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
